## Electronic Collections:

- **OhioLINK- Electronic Book Center (EBC):** Thousands of scholarly and reference e-books covering the humanities, sciences and social sciences.
- **OhioLINK- Electronic Journal Center (EJC):** Full text of 7000+ research journals.
- **EBSCO- Business Source Complete:** provides full text journals in all disciplines of business, including marketing, management, MIS, POM, accounting, finance and economics. Additional full text, non-journal content includes financial data, books, monographs, major reference works, book digests, conference proceedings, case studies, investment research reports, industry reports, market research reports, country reports, company profiles, SWOT analyses and more.
- **EBSCO- Academic Search Complete:** the world's most comprehensive scholarly, multi-disciplinary full-text database, with more than 5,300 full-text periodicals, including 4,400 peer-reviewed journals. In addition to full text, this database offers indexing and abstracts for more than 9,300 journals and a total of 10,900 publications including monographs, reports, conference proceedings, etc.

- **U. S. Department of the Treasury** (<http://www.treas.gov/>): The Treasury Department is the executive agency responsible for promoting economic prosperity and ensuring the financial security of the United States. The Department is responsible for a wide range of activities such as advising the President on economic and financial issues, encouraging sustainable economic growth, and fostering improved governance in financial institutions.
- **Federal Reserve** (<http://www.federalreserve.gov/>): The Federal Reserve System, often referred to as the Federal Reserve or simply "the Fed," is the central bank of the United States. It was created by Congress to provide the nation with a safer, more flexible, and more stable monetary and financial system. Over the years, its role has evolved and expanded.
- **Office of Management and Budget** (<http://www.whitehouse.gov/omb/>): OMB evaluates the effectiveness of agency programs, policies, and procedures, assesses competing funding demands among agencies, and sets funding priorities. OMB ensures that agency reports, rules, testimony, and proposed legislation are consistent with the President's Budget and with Administration policies.
- **Federal Accounting Standards Advisory Board** (<http://www.fasab.gov/accepted.html>): Includes drafts and documents for comment, projects, reports, and news releases of the Board.
- **Economic Policy Institute** (<http://www.epi.org>): A non-profit think tank which conducts research and issues publications and working papers on economic issues.
- **IRS Tax Statistics** (<http://www.irs.ustreas.gov/taxstats/index.html>): Contains business, individual, and charitable tax statistics and also includes publications and papers.
